The book consists mainly of step-by-step instructions for making a plain lidded box and a clam shell box. The instructions give precise details about the materials required and their sizes and each step is illustrated with photographs. The first box I made turned out surprisingly well. You will need to find and purchase material for the sample projects and the number one on-line supplier of book-binding material (the boxes are made of book board and book cloth) happens to be the authors' own store. But I also used my local art store for some of the paper. I completed both examples in the book and using some ideas from the book's illustrations of other boxes went on to make several different styles of box. Since the book also includes formulas for calculating material sizes for making boxes to any

custom size I bought my own copy. In the two months since starting box making I have ventured on to book binding and purchasing yet more material from the authors. If box making appeals to you then this book is a perfect introduction to the techniques required.
